



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

Statewide Unemployment

October 2023 • Seasonally Adjusted

New Mexico's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate (based on the Current Population Survey, also known as the household survey) was 3.8 percent in October 2023, up from 3.7 percent in September and up from 3.5 percent in October 2022. The national unemployment rate in October was 3.9 percent, up from 3.8 percent in September and up from 3.7 percent in October 2022.

Highlights


New Mexico's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate, at 3.8 percent, has slowly increased by 0.3 percentage points over the past five months. New Mexico's all time unemployment rate low was 3.4 percent in August 2022, only 0.4 percentage points lower than this month's rate. October's unemployment rate is over two times less than the pandemic high of 9.3 percent in May 2020.

Among all states, New Mexico was tied with the state of Washington for the 14th highest unemployment rate in the country. Nevada had the highest unemployment rate (5.4 percent) while Maryland had the lowest (1.7 percent).

Over the year, the state's labor force has grown by 23,182, or 2.5 percent, due to increases in both the number of people working and the number of people unemployed. Since October 2022, the number of employed has increased by 19,395, or 2.1 percent, while the number of unemployed increased by 3,787, or 11.4 percent.

Substate Unemployment

Highlights

At 7.4 percent, Luna County had New Mexico's highest (not seasonally adjusted) unemployment rate, followed by Sierra County (5.2 percent).

This month, Los Alamos County had the lowest unemployment rate (2.1 percent), followed by Eddy County (2.5 percent)

Guadalupe County had the largest over-the-year decrease in unemployment rate, with a 0.4 percentage point decrease. Union County had the largest over-the-year increase (up 0.9 percentage points).

At 3.5 percent, the Santa Fe MSA had the lowest not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate among the state's metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs). The Albuquerque MSA had a rate of 3.6 percent. The Farmington and Las Cruces MSAs were tied for the highest unemployment rate among the MSAs (both at 3.8 percent).

The unemployment rates for the Santa Fe and Albuquerque MSAs were tied for the largest increase, both increasing 0.6 percentage points since October 2022. The Las Cruces MSA had the next largest unemployment rate increase of 0.4 percentage points. The Farmington MSA had the smallest over-the-year unemployment rate increase, up 0.2 percentage points.

LAUS publishes estimates of the civilian labor force, employment, and unemployment monthly. Data measure persons 16 years old and older who are employed or actively seeking employment.

Statewide Industry Employment Growth

Over the year, New Mexico's total nonagricultural employment increased by 16,700 jobs, or 1.9 percent. The private sector grew by 7,800 jobs, or 1.2 percent, while the public sector was up 8,900 jobs, or 4.9 percent.

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

Employment in mining and construction rose by 5,400 jobs, or 7.4 percent. The

majority of gains were within the construction industry, which grew by 3,300 jobs, or 6.5 percent. Mining employment was up 2,100 jobs, or 9.5 percent, over the year. Manufacturing was up 300 jobs, or 1.0 percent. Within manufacturing, non-durable goods manufacturing was up 700 jobs, or 5.0 percent. Durable goods manufacturing employment was down 400 jobs, or 2.5 percent.

Private education and health services was up 5,300 jobs, or 3.7 percent. Within the private education and health services industry, health care and social assistance was up 4,000 jobs, or 3.3 percent and private educational services was up 1,300 jobs, or 5.9 percent. Leisure and hospitality was up 5,300 jobs, or 5.6 percent.


Professional and business services was down 4,800 jobs, or 4.1 percent. Trade, transportation, and utilities was down 1,700 jobs, or 1.2 percent. Within the industry, a gain of 200 jobs, or 0.7 percent, in transportation, warehousing, and utilities was offset by a loss of 1,400 jobs, or 1.5 percent, in retail trade and a loss of 500 jobs, or 2.4 percent, in wholesale trade. Information was down 1,000 jobs, or 8.9 percent. Employment in financial activities was down 1,200 jobs, or 3.4 percent. Miscellaneous other services was up 200 jobs, or 0.7 percent.

In the public sector, state government was up 4,400 jobs, or 8.1 percent. Employment in local government was up 3,600 jobs, or 3.6 percent. Federal government employment was up 900 jobs, or 3.1 percent.

October 22 to October 23 Over-the-Year % Change




Over the year, the Albuquerque MSA grew by 7,600 jobs in total nonfarm employment, representing a gain of 1.9 percent. The following private sector industries added jobs: mining and construction increased by 2,500 jobs, or 9.6 percent; leisure and hospitality grew by 2,400 jobs, or 5.5 percent; private education and health services was up 1,600 jobs, or 2.4 percent; and miscellaneous other services increased by 500 jobs, or 4.2 percent. The private sector industries that lost employment included professional and business services, down 700 jobs, or 1.0 percent; trade, transportation, and utilities declined by 500 jobs, or 0.7 percent; and information, which fell by 300 jobs, or 5.2 percent. Financial activities and manufacturing remained unchanged from last year's level.

Public sector employment increased by 2,100 jobs, or 2.6 percent. State government was up 1,100 jobs, or 4.0 percent, and federal government and local government increased by 500 jobs each, or 3.5 percent and 1.3 percent, respectively.

The Las Cruces MSA total nonfarm employment was up 1,200 jobs, or 1.5 percent. The following private sector industries reported growth: private education and health services (up 800 jobs, or 4.5 percent); leisure and hospitality (up 300 jobs, or 3.4 percent); and mining and construction (up 300 jobs, or 7.9 percent). Trade, transportation, and utilities was down 400 jobs, or 3.4 percent. Employment in information and manufacturing were down 100 jobs each, or 16.7 percent and 2.9 percent, respectively. 





and business services, and miscellaneous *other services* remained unchanged from the previous year's level.

The public sector increased by 400 jobs, or 1.9 percent. Local government was up 400 jobs, or 4.1 percent, and federal government was up 100 jobs, or 2.9 percent. State government employment fell by 100 jobs, or 1.3 percent, from last year.

Total nonfarm employment in the Santa Fe MSA was up 1,700 jobs, or 2.8 percent, from last year. In the private sector, leisure and hospitality reported a gain of 500 jobs, or 4.7 percent. Private education and health services grew by 400 jobs, or 3.7 percent. Trade, transportation, and utilities was up 200 jobs, or 2.1 percent. Three industries reported an increase of 100 jobs each: mining and construction (3.3 percent), professional and business services (1.7 percent), and miscellaneous *other services* (2.9 percent). Manufacturing, information, and financial activities were unchanged from the previous year's employment level.

Public sector employment increased by 300 jobs, or 2.1 percent. Local government employment was up 400 jobs, or 6.5 percent, and federal government employment increased by 100 jobs, or 11.1 percent. Employment in state government was down 200 jobs, or 2.9 percent, from the previous year's level.

The Farmington MSA's total nonfarm employment was up 1,600 jobs, or 3.5 percent. The private service-providing sector increased by 1,000 jobs, or 3.9 percent. Employment in the public sector increased by 400 jobs, or 3.8 percent, over the year, with the entire amount attributed to local government, which increased 4.7 percent.

Job Gains

At its October meeting, the New Mexico Economic Development Department's Job Training Incentive Program (JTIP) board approved \$491,712 in funding to support the creation of 39 jobs with five New Mexico companies, including: Little Toad Creek, Deming (eight jobs); Red River Brewing Company, Red River (two jobs); Wink, Albuquerque (eight jobs); Beck & Bulow Buffalo, Santa Fe (three jobs); and AerSale Landing Solutions, Rio Rancho (18 jobs).

Bernalillo

Star Scientific, a hydrogen research and manufacturing company, announced that its first North American location would be located in Albuquerque. The company will eventually hire up to 200 workers for the site and no opening date has been announced.

McKinley

Pilot Co. is opening a One9 travel center in Gallup. The fueling and food center will open in early 2024 and will employ 40 workers.


Expanding establishments are existing firms with a net overthe-quarter increase in employment.

Closing establishments are those with positive employment in the previous quarter and with zero employment in the current quarter. (Closings may be either **deaths** or temporary closings.)

* The Bureau of Labor Statistics waits three quarters to determine whether an establishment death is a permanent closing or a temporary shutdown, which is why there is always a lag of three quarters for the publication of establishment death statistics.



Just under one in four New Mexico youth aged 16 – 19 who were enrolled in school were also working. Guadalupe County had the highest rate (82.3 percent) of youth aged 16-19 who were working while enrolled in school.


Percentage of In-School Youth Ages 16–19 Who Were Also Employed

The percentage of New Mexico youth aged 16–19 who were not enrolled in school and were either unemployed or not in the labor force was 52.7 percent in 2021, 6.8 percentage points higher than the national average. This figure includes high school graduates, including equivalency, and those who did not receive a diploma.




Percentage of Out of School Youth Ages 16–19 Who Were Unemployed or not in the Labor Force

The labor force participation rate of youth aged 16-19 who did not graduate nor were enrolled in high school was 43.3 percent for New Mexico, 3.6 percentage points lower than that of the United States.

About 10.4 percent of New Mexicans aged 20 - 24 were unemployed. (Please note the first four years of compiled data were collected before the COVID epidemic started.)

Roosevelt County had the highest rate of population between the ages of 16 and 24 (19.4 percent), while Guadalupe County had the lowest rate (4.1 percent), with only 183 persons in this age range living within its borders.

About 16.0 percent, of New Mexicans aged 18–24 years did not have a high school diploma or equivalent. This figure is 4.0 percentage points higher than the national rate of 12.0 percent.

The rate of 18–24-year-old youth who received an associate degree or higher was 12.6 percent in New Mexico, 5.1 percentage points lower than the U.S. rate of 17.7 percent.

Highlights from the 2023 Veterans Profile



Below are highlights from the 2023 Veterans Profile, a publication that provides demographic and economic data on New Mexicans who have served in the United States Armed Forces. As shown in Exhibit 1, 42.6 percent of the veteran population in New Mexico was participating in the labor force in 2022 (i.e., they were employed or actively seeking work). This rate was 5.3 percentage points lower than the rate for veterans nationwide (47.9 percent) and 15.8 percentage points lower than the rate for New Mexico's nonveterans (58.4 percent). Virginia had the highest veteran participation rate (59.7 percent) while Maine had the lowest (40.3 percent).

Labor force participation rates of veterans and nonveterans fell in New Mexico and the U.S. since 2007, with participation for both groups in New Mexico declining at a slightly faster rate than in the U.S (Exhibit 2). The lowest participation rate for veterans nationwide occurred in 2021 due to COVID-19; 2022 was the lowest participation rate New Mexico veterans and nonveterans alike.


As of 2022, 3.3 percent of New Mexico's veterans were unemployed (Exhibit 3). This rate was 0.5 percentage points higher than the rate for veterans nationwide (2.8 percent) and 0.5 percentage points lower than the rate for New Mexico's nonveterans (3.8 percent). North Dakota had the lowest veteran unemployment rate (0.7 percent) while Nevada had the highest (5.2 percent). Since 2007, the unemployment rates for both groups (Exhibit 4) were highest during the Great Recession, followed by the time during COVID-19.












